




## The *Power* OF THREE

A triumvirate collaboration between Saint Laurent, Galerie Patrick Seguin and French architect and designer Charlotte Perriand, is breathing new life into historic masterpieces

SAINT LAURENT'S CONNECTION WITH THE ARTS CONTINUES WITH

THE MAISON'S LATEST PROJECT



Today, under the watchful eye of creative director Anthony Vaccarello, the house is still deeply integrated in arts and culture, creating cultural spaces like Paris' Saint Laurent Babylone and collaborating on art projects, such as the *I Need To Live* exhibition with fashion photographer Juergen Teller.

For 2025, that connection continues, with Saint Laurent and Anthony Vaccarello presenting an exclusive collaboration with the estate of French architect and designer Charlotte Perriand. Entitled Saint Laurent — Charlotte Perriand, the exhibition — on view from October 23 to November 22 at Galerie Patrick Seguin in Paris' La Bastille district — will showcase four exceptional furniture designs by Perriand, dating from 1943-1967. Existing only as single editions or as sketches prior to this project, each piece has been reissued

using a painstaking development process with the exhibition shaped under Vaccarello's curatorial vision.

Pieces on show include the Banquette (1967), designed for the Japanese Ambassador's residence in Paris; the Bibliothèque Rio bookcase (1962), made for Perriand's husband in Brazil; the Table Mille-Feuilles (1963), never realised in Perriand's lifetime due to its complexity; and the Fauteuil Visiteur Indochine armchair (1943), recreated from a single surviving drawing.

Each piece will be available on a made-to-order basis, as a limited edition, so if you can envisage one of these beauties in your home, run don't walk.
